ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

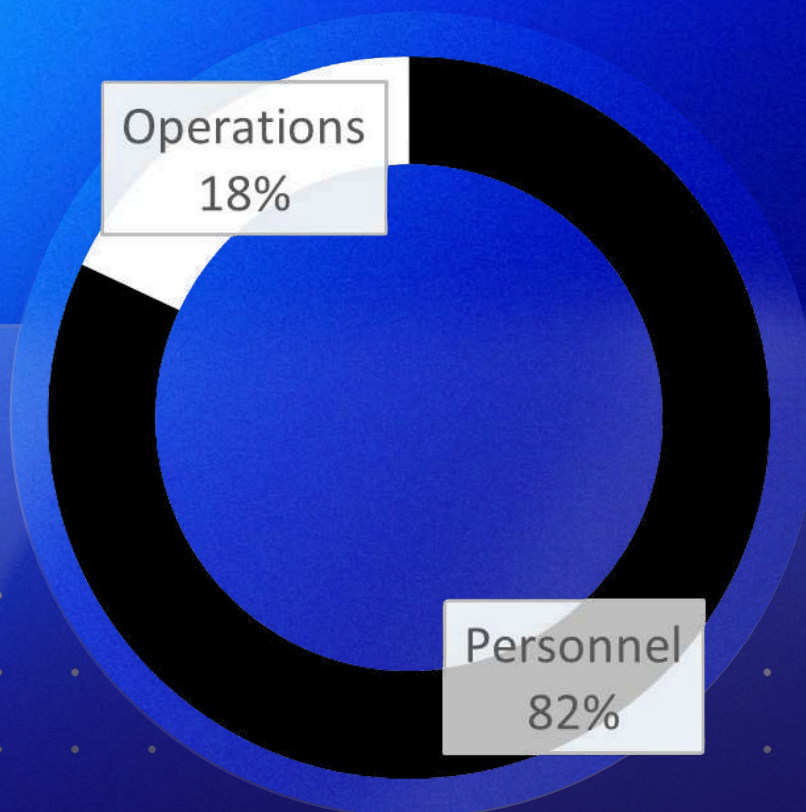
Lone Peak Police Department Organizational Chart

FISCAL YEAR 2025 BUDGET



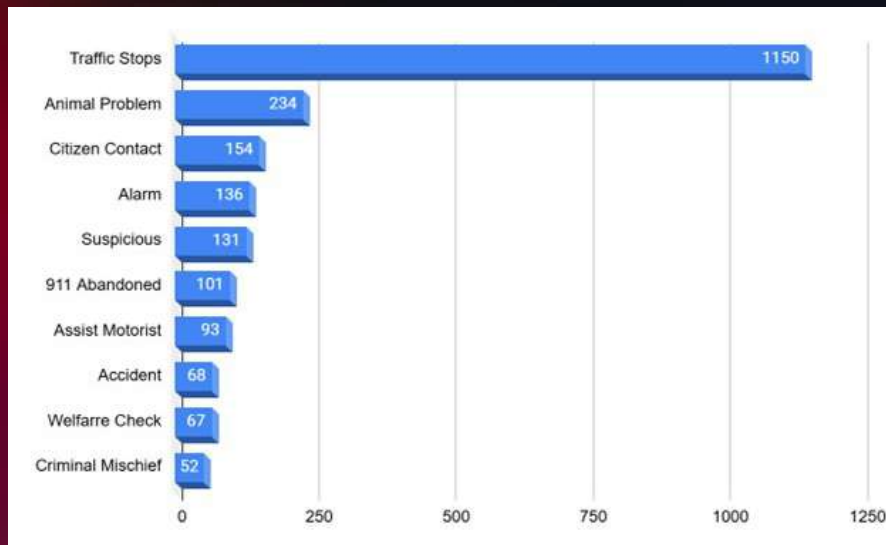

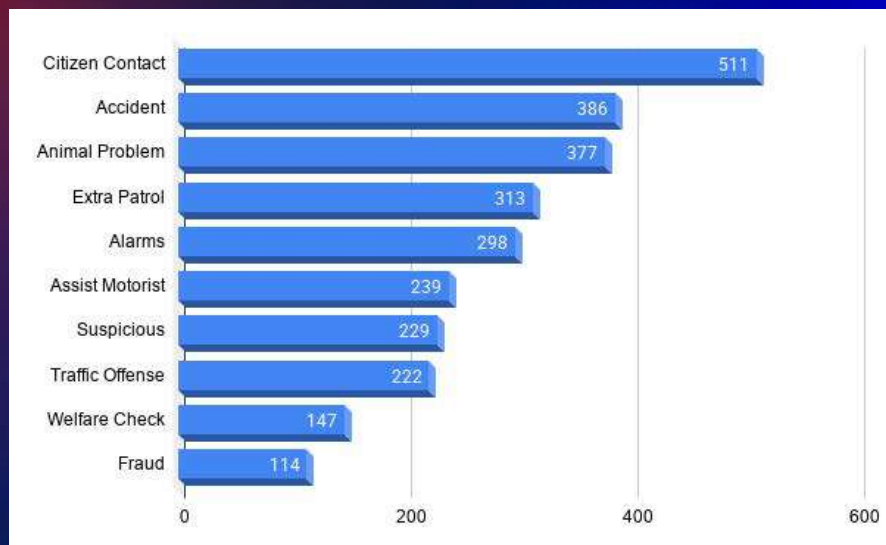

HIGHLAND PATROL STATS



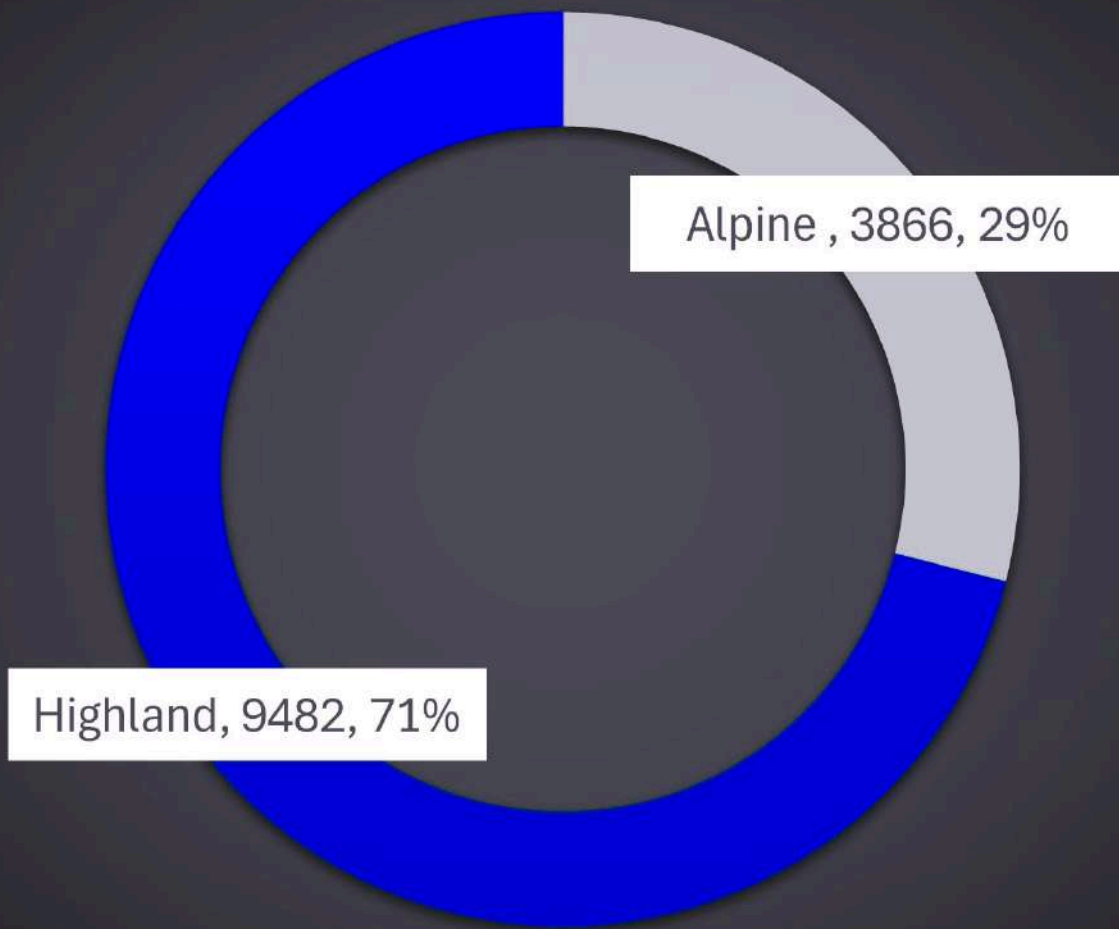

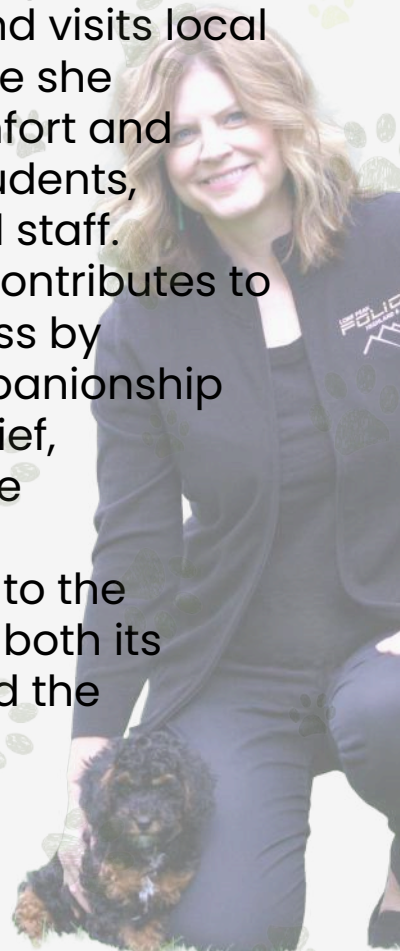
